













Last week, she told the children about how a person's leg works, with all the muscles and nerves. She showed them a picture of a leg working, and all the children moved their legs around.








The other week, Sam was especially happy when Mr Potts read a story to the class about green eggs and ham. Sometimes Mr Potts tells the children about how Jesus would do things.







Christian schools are God-centred and child focussed. They challenge students with a celebration of the Lordship of Jesus Christ over all creation.
